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what lies behind the language we use as counsellors and psychotherapists how does language fit into a therapeutic context can we truly say what we mean and hear what is said in the consulting room this book takes apart lays out and repositions the most basic of therapeutic tools the language used to communicate between therapist and client it begins with a summary of the different schools of thought on language acquisition from infancy onwards it addresses ways in which philosophical and social contexts may impact on the

thoughts and words available for speech following this it focuses on the detail of the words spoken in a consulting room and considers dialogue in the arts therapies where speech may not be the primary tool for understanding the book also examines what happens when words fail how symbols are essential for communication and whether the emphasis on words in the talking therapies has limited the range of communication in the consulting room an example of this limitation is offered in an extended discussion of gender and language the book addresses counsellors and psychotherapists from all major theoretical orientations from psychodynamic therapies through to humanistic and existential approaches maintaining an overview that is relevant to an integrative position written for students of counselling and psychotherapy as well as practitioners who want to develop their skills and awareness words and symbols engages the reader in understanding the essence of therapeutic communication

there is a growing awareness in the counselling and pastoral care professions that the appropriate use of imagery and symbolism in counselling can be a useful tool in helping clients to resolve inner conflicts which they would otherwise find hard to confront this comprehensive book explores the therapeutic use of imagination and how the use of myths legends and spontaneous images can clothe feelings with images and thereby make them easier to work with and control the book is intended as a working model which takes the reader through the various stages of imagery and symbolism and is illustrated by many case studies that highlight various principles and topics and create a bridge between theory and practice a companion volume dictionary of images and symbols in counselling provides an a z of images and symbols

the book does provide an excellent resource offering a holistic and flexible approach and a variety of techniques these provide a useful toolkit of practitioners working closely with young people however its core readership is counsellors with young people though there are now many different kinds of counselling leading to qualification and careful selection is necessary there are few that are particularly oriented towards counselling young people counselling adolescents goes a good way towards filling that gap it will be an effective support to the professional counselor working with young people in fact many wonder how they functioned without it youth policy this book is a useful text for professionals with knowledge of counselling skills and the ideas are well presented the book gave me the opportunity to question my counselling skills especially with regard to adolescents and in so doing identify areas for progression and further training emotional behavioural difficulties counselling adolescents second edition includes two new important chapters the first discusses how counsellors can make use of adolescent communication processes counsellors who understand these processes are better equipped to connect with young clients the second new chapter explores the way in which the psychotherapeutic process can promote change in adolescents the authors suggest that to be an effective counsellor of young people these processes need to be fully understood the book closes with practical case studies to show how counsellors can work pro actively with adolescents this book will

according to carl jung the goal of human life is self realization we have to strive to become whole deep down we are all creative beings and we have to make use of our creativity to become what we really are kast explores jung's concept of the human being and describes the path to wholeness which since jung is known as the individuation process it becomes clear that wholeness is only possible through the interplay between conscious and unconscious however the two have different languages consciousness uses word logic whereas the unconscious uses dream logic both languages would be forever foreign to each other were it not for symbols which mediate between the two our unconscious encodes its knowledge in symbols which we then have to translate into the language of our consciousness thus symbols are focal points of psychic development and it is through them that we can become whole human beings jung taught us the techniques with which we can

make the creative core of the unconscious available to consciousness kast explains them by using numerous examples from her daily work as a therapist she shows us how psychological problems can be overcome by working on the symbols in which they express themselves in a language that can be readily grasped by the general reader kast goes on to explain the basic thought of jungian psychotherapy covering the correlation between symbols and complexes with a special emphasis on the ego complex the healing function of the archetypes and how they appear in and interact with symbols and symbols in transference and countertransference powerful tools in psychotherapy kast also discusses the interplay of psychosomatic diseases and symbols the dynamics of symbols is not only of immediate interest to all psychologists and their patients it is of direct concern to everyone who has the desire to become a whole human being

this second edition has extended information on the range of disabilities covered including those with learning difficulties victims of sexual abuse and people who are hiv positive other developments such as non verbal counselling are also explained
